The short question in this application is as to whether the applicant was entitled to count the entire period towards his seniority including the period he worked on ad-hoc basis prior to the regularisation. The applicant was initially appointed on 6th July, 1965 as Investigator (Chemical), Small Industries Services Institute and he was duly promoted on 17th June, 1968 on the post of Small Industries Promotion Officer (Chemical) and previously the post of S.I.P.O. was known as Junior Field Officer (Chemical). The applicant was declared quasi permanent w.e.f. 6.7.1968 and was confirmed as Investigator w.e.f. 30th January, 1970. In the year 1971 the post of S.I.P.O. was declared as Class II post and their service conditions were governed by the statutory rules known as 'Junior Field Officers Investigator (Small scale Industries Organisation) Recruitment Rules 1962. In the seniority list of Small Industries Promotion Officer in the Chemical Section under non-Engineering Technical Divisions in the SIDO as on 1st July, 1980 the applicant's name was missing and he was not shown in the seniority list. The applicant like various other persons was also regularised on the post of S.I.P.O. on 17th June, 1983. The applicant's claim is that of course his seniority should be counted w.e.f. the date he was promoted on the said post that is in the

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year 1968.

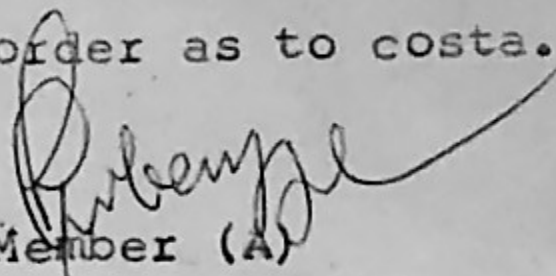
2. The claim of the applicant has been resisted by the respondents who have pleaded that it was a selection post, and the applicant's case was considered by the D.P.C. and the D.P.C. did not find him ^{suitable} ~~and that~~ is why the applicant was not promoted. The meeting of the D.P.C. was convened on 1.3.1976 to consider the promotion of officers to the posts of S.I.P.O. against the 5 available vacancies. 18 names including the name of applicant were considered and the names of 5 officers ~~were~~ considered and they were graded higher than that of the applicant. The respondents have stated that the applicant became eligible for promotion only on 6.7.1970 after completing 5 years of service in the grade as provided in the recruitment rules and his name was included in the seniority list earlier ~~due~~ to mistake, and ~~earlier~~ as he was promoted to the grade of S.I.P.O. (Chemical) on ad-hoc basis his name was not included in the list of S.I.P.O. as it was purely an ad-hoc promotion. Again the D.P.C. met for filling of 3 vacancies 27.9.1978 and the names of 15 officers including the applicant were considered, but the applicant was not recommended by D.P.C. for promotion and those two persons who were juniors to the applicant were recommended for promotion and accordingly promoted.

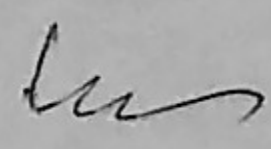
3. The applicant ^{has} ~~is~~ continuously agitated with the matter and ultimately he was regularised with effect from the date mentioned above. As the applicant was regularised on a subsequent date, and the post was selection post, the applicant cannot claim himself to be senior to those who were selected earlier than him. It is true that the juniors were selected prior to the selection of the applicant and the applicant has given various grounds for their selection including

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that they were related to some ^{one} higher in the department or the nominee of some one made and so on. But the Departmental Promotion Committee after considering the record found them fit and graded them higher than the applicant. We cannot sit in the judgment over the assessment made by the Departmental Promotion Committee and that too at this stage, and the applicant's claim for seniority cannot succeed and accordingly this application has got to be dismissed and is dismissed. No order as to costs.
